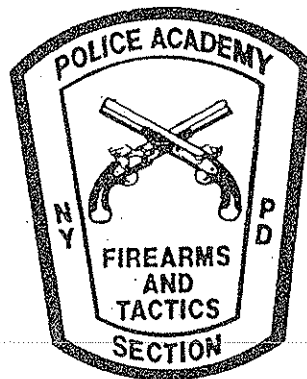

INTRODUCTION

The Firearms Discharge Report is compiled and produced annually by the Police Academy, Firearms and Tactics Section. The information contained in this report is obtained from Firearms Discharge/Assault Reports prepared by uniformed members of the service and narrative reports prepared by investigating supervisory personnel.

This report provides a statistical analysis of firearms discharges by uniformed members of the service. It also serves as a training tool. Patterns and possible hazards are identified which allows the Department to structure training courses to address current conditions. Tendencies, circumstances or conditions which may occur during one or more incidents permits the Department to incorporate necessary changes into training cycles to help promote the safety of all concerned.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

Firearms Incident (shooting)	Defines any incident during which a member of the service fired his/her weapon for any reason.
Defense of Self/Others	Defines any incident whereby the MOS fired his/her weapon to defend him/her self or another against a perpetrator. Includes gunfights and other shootings versus perpetrators.
Gunfight	Defines any incident during which both the perpetrator and member(s) of the service fired their weapons at each other. An exchange of gunfire.
Other shootings vs. Perpetrator	Defines any incident whereby the MOS fired his/her weapon in defense of himself/herself or another against a perpetrator and the perpetrator does not return fire.
FDR	Firearms Discharge Report. Source document used to compile statistical information for inclusion in this report.

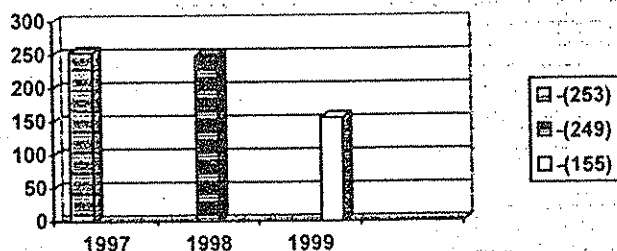
Comparison Of Major Shooting Incidents: 1999-1998

This Firearms Discharge Report is broken down into several main categories: (1) **GUNFIGHTS** - where the officer and the perpetrator fire at each other; (2) **OTHER SHOOTINGS vs. PERPS** - where an officer fires in defense of himself/herself or another against a perpetrator and the perpetrator does not return fire; (3) **AGAINST DOGS**; and (4) **ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGES** - where an officer unintentionally discharges a firearm. A final category (5) **"ASSAULTS"** - officers assaulted by any weapon, but does not fire his/her weapon - is at the end of this report. These reports are examined to identify dangerous conditions and to develop counter tactics.

During 1999, a total of 155 Firearms Discharge Reports were reviewed for this report. There was a decrease in the number of incidents reported for most of the major categories in 1999 as compared to 1998.

Any incident whereby the member of the service fired his/her weapon to defend him/herself or another against a perpetrator.

Gunfights

Gunfight defines any incident during which both the perpetrator and the member of the service fired their weapons at each other.

During 1999 there were 20 incidents where MOS and perpetrators exchanged gunfire, compared to 26 in 1998, a decrease of 23%.

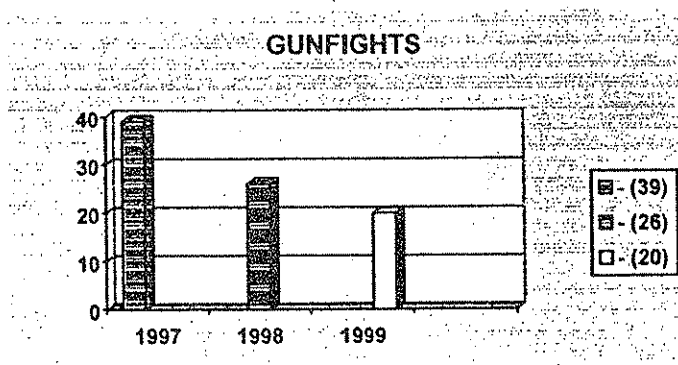

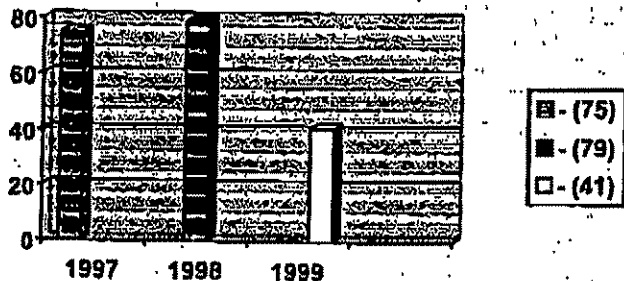
Other Shooting Incidents Involving Perpetrators

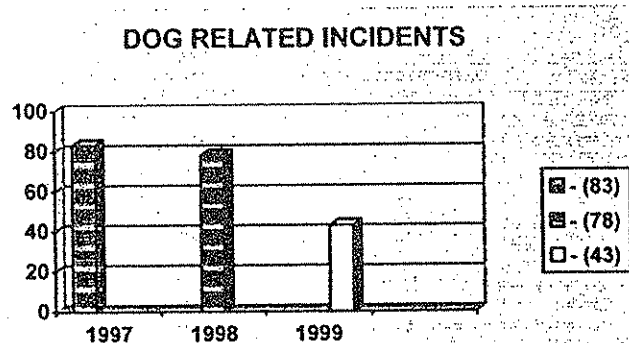

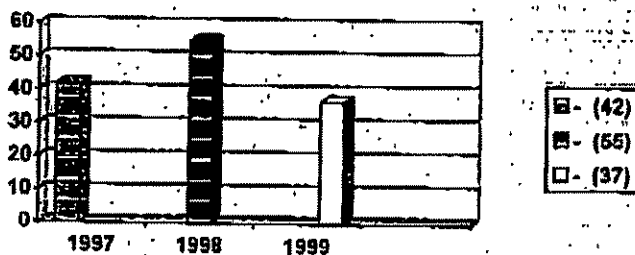
NUMBER OF INJURIES SUSTAINED AS A RESULT OF ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGES

Gunfight Synopses

<i>January 15, 1999</i>	77 Pct.	4X12	Vehicle Stop
<p>Two MOS stopped a motorist for a traffic infraction. Upon approaching the driver's side of the vehicle, after lowering the car window, the occupants fired two rounds at the officers. The officers returned fire, whereupon the perpetrators escaped in the vehicle. They were later apprehended.</p>			
<i>February 27, 1999</i>	47 Pct.	4X12	Commercial Robbery
<p>Two MOS were canvassing with a civilian complainant for a perpetrator of a robbery of a store. The perpetrator was located in a taxicab. A foot chase ensued whereupon the perpetrator fired several rounds at the officers, the officer returned fire – The chase continued, again shots were exchanged. The perpetrator fled the scene but was apprehended later.</p>			
<i>March 15, 1999</i>	67 Pct.	4X12	Commercial Robbery
<p>MOS responded to radio run of "armed robbery in progress". At the scene, one perpetrator physically prevented MOS from entering location. MOS retreated and took cover. Perpetrator exited with a hostage, holding a gun to the hostage's head. A second perpetrator with a gun exited the store and was ordered to drop his weapon. Instead, he fired at MOS and retreated back into the store. At this time the hostage was able to free himself from the first perpetrator and officers pursued the perpetrator who turned with gun pointed at them. MOS fired hitting the perpetrator and proceeded to handcuff him. Aviation Unit located two other perpetrators on rooftop and they were taken into custody. One perpetrator died, one was injured, and one was unhurt. Hostage sustained three gunshot wounds, however, it is not known if injured by MOS or perpetrators.</p>

<i>April 12, 1999</i>	75 Pct.	12X8	Street Robbery
-----------------------	---------	------	----------------

MOS was informed by civilians that a robbery was in progress. At location, officer followed suspect as he was leaving the robbery scene. While continuing to pursue the suspect, other MOS responded. MOS heard a gunshot. As the officers continued to pursue, the perpetrator turned and fired twice, missing the officers. One officer fired six times at the perpetrator, missing him. Perpetrator was observed removing a Kahr 9mm pistol from a canvass holster. The pistol was one of three that he had removed from complainant during the robbery. After MOS lost sight of the perpetrator, another gunshot was heard. A search of the area led to the perpetrator who had shot himself in the head. Perpetrator DOA. No MOS injured.

<i>May 7, 1999</i>	108 Pct.	Off Duty	Commercial Robbery
--------------------	----------	----------	--------------------

Off duty detective while at authorized second employment, a commercial check cashing establishment, was accosted at gunpoint while outside sitting in his van. Perpetrator approached van brandishing a 9mm semiautomatic pistol and pointed it at the officer. Detective struggled to disarm the perpetrator, which caused one round to discharge striking detective in right bicep, breaking his arm. Perpetrator fled into the store, followed by the injured detective. Perpetrator turned and fired several rounds at the detective who fired once, hitting the perpetrator in the head. A civilian bystander suffered a non-life threatening gunshot wound at the hands of the perpetrator.

<i>May 28, 1999</i>	73 Pct.	4X12	Homicide Suspect

MOS pursued subject wanted in connection with a past homicide. Upon being surrounded by MOS, perpetrator drew a .22 caliber semiauto and fired at officer one time. Police Officer fired once, hitting the perpetrator in the left shoulder. Perpetrator attempted to flee but was quickly apprehended.

Street

MOS in unmarked van assigned to Bronx Narcotics initiative was preparing to conduct a search warrant execution. MOS observed a male fire 3 rounds from a 357 revolver killing another male. MOS exited van, identified self and ordered the perpetrator to stop. Perpetrator fled with MOS in pursuit. Perpetrator turned and fired 1 round. Officer fired twice, missing the perpetrator. Perpetrator fired again at the officer. Officer fired three additional rounds, missing the perpetrator. Perpetrator was apprehended.

August 2, 1999

24 Pct.

4X12

Gang Assault

Sergeant and partner assigned to Gang Unit observes several groups exit a party whereupon a fight broke out. Several males punched another male to the pavement and started kicking the male in the head. MOS exited vehicle and the crowd broke up. MOS followed the perpetrator who had been assaulting the male. The Sergeant followed the perpetrator up a flight of steps and challenged the male who ignored him. The perpetrator fired once and missed. Sergeant fired once, missing the perpetrator. Perpetrator was arrested.

August 7, 1999

13 Pct.

12X8

Street Robbery

Captain performing solo patrol in the 13th Precinct, was flagged down by a male who informed the Captain that his friend was being robbed at gunpoint by 3 or 4 males nearby and that he also heard 7 or 8 shots being fired. Captain proceeded to the location and observed the individuals. Captain exited his vehicle in order to investigate the allegation. At this time, the suspects proceeded to walk away. One of them observed the captain and produced a handgun and racked the slide and aimed the weapon towards the captain and fired at least 1 round. Captain returned several rounds at perpetrator. Witnesses later stated they observed at least 2 of the suspects shooting at the captain. The perpetrators fled. The captain pursued and 1 perpetrator turned and aimed weapon again at the captain who fired at the perpetrator. Two perpetrators entered a vehicle and fled. Captain returned to his vehicle to continue pursuit and transmitted a description of suspect's vehicle and direction of flight. Suspect's vehicle was stopped and one of the 2 perpetrators was found to be suffering a gunshot wound to lower right leg. Another perpetrator was later apprehended at a nearby garage.

<i>August 13, 1999</i>	32 Pct.	12X8	Street Robbery

Two MOS involved in a pursuit of four perpetrators who had robbed an off-duty New York State Police Officer of his firearm, jewelry and vehicle engaged in gunfire with the fleeing perpetrators. A female pedestrian was struck in the legs by the gunfire. Three of the perpetrators were later apprehended.

<i>September 18, 1999</i>	67 Pct.	12X8	Street Buy & Bust Operation
---------------------------	---------	------	-----------------------------

Undercover Narcotics officers from Brooklyn South were engaged in a "buy & bust" operation. One undercover was in the company of a confidential informant attempting to purchase narcotics while the other was acting as "ghost". Undercover and informant were approached by a male known to have previously sold crack/cocaine to BSND officers. Undercover decided to refuse the offer so that the case could be expanded by purchasing from a different dealer. A verbal exchange ensued. Perpetrator reached into his waistband and pulled out a .380 caliber semiautomatic pistol and pointed it at the undercover who then drew his weapon. The perpetrator fired two times, hitting the officer once in the foot. Undercover fired 16 rounds, undercover ghost discharged 9 rounds. Perpetrator was struck and died from his wounds.

<i>September 20, 1999</i>	75 Pct.	4x12	Anti Crime Bicycle Stop
---------------------------	---------	------	-------------------------

MOS performing plainclothes anti crime duty observed a male riding a bicycle on the sidewalk. MOS exited unmarked vehicle and identified themselves. They ordered the bicyclist to stop, intending to issue a summons. The male discarded his bike and fled on foot. The perpetrator turned back towards the officers with a gun in hand and discharged one round. The perpetrator then attempted to carjack a livery cab but was unsuccessful and continued to flee on foot. One officer reentered unmarked vehicle while the other continued to pursue the perpetrator on foot. Perpetrator again turned and fired one round. Pursuing officer fired one round. Responding supervisor observed the perpetrator hiding behind garbage cans and ordered the perpetrator to stand and raise both hands. Perpetrator had weapon in hand and proceeded to aim it at the sergeant, refusing an order to drop the gun. The sergeant fired four rounds, hitting the perpetrator once in the left leg.

Street

MOS on patrol in the confines of the 83 precinct, patrolling a known GLA area, observed a male walking on the railroad tracks. Officers exited RMP and approached the male and issued a verbal command to stop. The suspect fled with officers in pursuit. While one officer was within 15-20 feet of the perpetrator, perpetrator turned and fired one round. Officer drew his weapon and fired three rounds at the perpetrator. Perpetrator fled. Area was searched by Canine and Aviation Units with negative results.

October 13, 1999

5 Pct.

4X12

Commercial Robbery

MOS conducting a "buy & bust" operation in confines of the 5th precinct encountered two armed perpetrators fleeing the scene of an apparent attempted robbery where four civilians were shot. (Two were killed and two were injured). MOS verbally identified themselves and ordered the males to stop. Two perpetrators produced weapons and began firing at detectives and continued to flee. Another MOS responding to scene was able to apprehend one perpetrator and remove his weapon, a .380 semiautomatic pistol. The second perpetrator was apprehended and his weapon, a .357 revolver, was recovered. The perpetrators fired three rounds at the officers, missing them. Two MOS fired thirteen rounds, missing the perpetrators.

October 28, 1999

69 Pct.

4x12

Gas Station Robbery

MOS having just completed vertical patrol heard yelling at a nearby gas station. Investigation revealed that 3 males had just committed an armed robbery and had fired one shot while inside the location. Officers pursued the perpetrators and ordered them to stop. Perpetrator disregarded the order. One perpetrator pointed a firearm at MOS and fired one round at the officers. The two MOS fired four rounds at the perpetrator, hitting him once. Two other perpetrators later arrested.

1999 FIREARMS DISCHARGE REPORT

November 23, 1999 43 Pct. 4x12 Buy & Bust Operation

Four undercover officers assigned to South Bronx Initiative, were conducting a "buy & bust" operation. Two undercover officers entered apartment in order to purchase crack cocaine where they were met by two perpetrators brandishing a 9mm handgun and a knife. One undercover was struck twice in the face with butt of gun, the other officer was shoved around and was relieved of his cellular phone. Both officers were then pushed into vestibule area of the apartment. Perpetrator fired one round, which grazed one officer in left torso area. Backup officers who were monitoring the Kel Set arrived on scene as the perpetrators fled the apartment. Four MOS then fired twenty-three rounds, striking a perpetrator three times in both legs. Two perpetrators were arrested. A third perpetrator was later found by K-9 Unit hiding under a car and suffering from a gunshot wound to right hand.

December 15, 1999 47 Pct. Off Duty Apartment

Off duty MOS at girlfriends residence within the confines of the 47 precinct. As a cousin of the girlfriend was entering the residence, an armed male threatened him and placed a gun to his head. Proceeding to the second floor of the residence, gunman was confronted by MOS and an exchange of gunfire occurred. The perpetrator fired four rounds at the officer, who fired ten rounds striking the perpetrator two times. Perpetrator fled scene and was later arrested at Harlem Hospital where he was being treated for gunshot wounds to the left leg.

December 19, 1999 109 Pct. 12X8 Dispute

MOS on patrol, responded to a radio run of a 10-52 "dispute". At the location, officers heard one round fired within a vestibule and observed a male fall to the ground after being shot in his back. Another shot was fired, this time in the direction of the responding officers. With perpetrator in sight, one officer returned one shot at perpetrator who fled into an apartment. Perpetrator was later found to be suffering a gunshot wound to right calf.

49 Pct.

Off-Duty

Off duty undercover officer became engaged in a confrontation with a male who fired once, injuring the officer. The undercover officer fired eleven times at the perpetrator, who fled on foot. A female bystander at the scene was discovered to have been hit by gunfire two times in thigh and abdomen. Arriving MOS found undercover officer lying on sidewalk with a civilian rendering pressure to the bleeding officer. The undercover officer was transported to hospital via RMP. Shortly after incident a .380 Bryes semiautomatic was recovered near the crime scene.

December 31, 1999

46 Pct.

4X12

Anti Crime / Street

Three MOS assigned to 46 precinct anti-crime on routine patrol, heard shots fired and then observed a female running past them screaming. MOS exited RMP and were confronted by three males, two of which had firearms drawn and began to fire in direction of the officers. MOS identified themselves and fired ten rounds, hitting the perpetrator three times in his torso. Two other perpetrators fled and remain unapprehended.

ASSAULTS

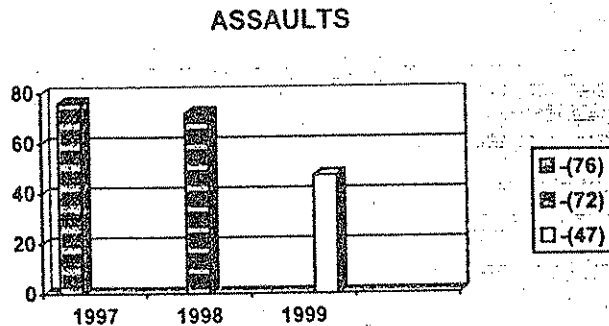

During 1999, there were 54 MOS who were assaulted by perpetrators. Of those officers, 40 were injured.

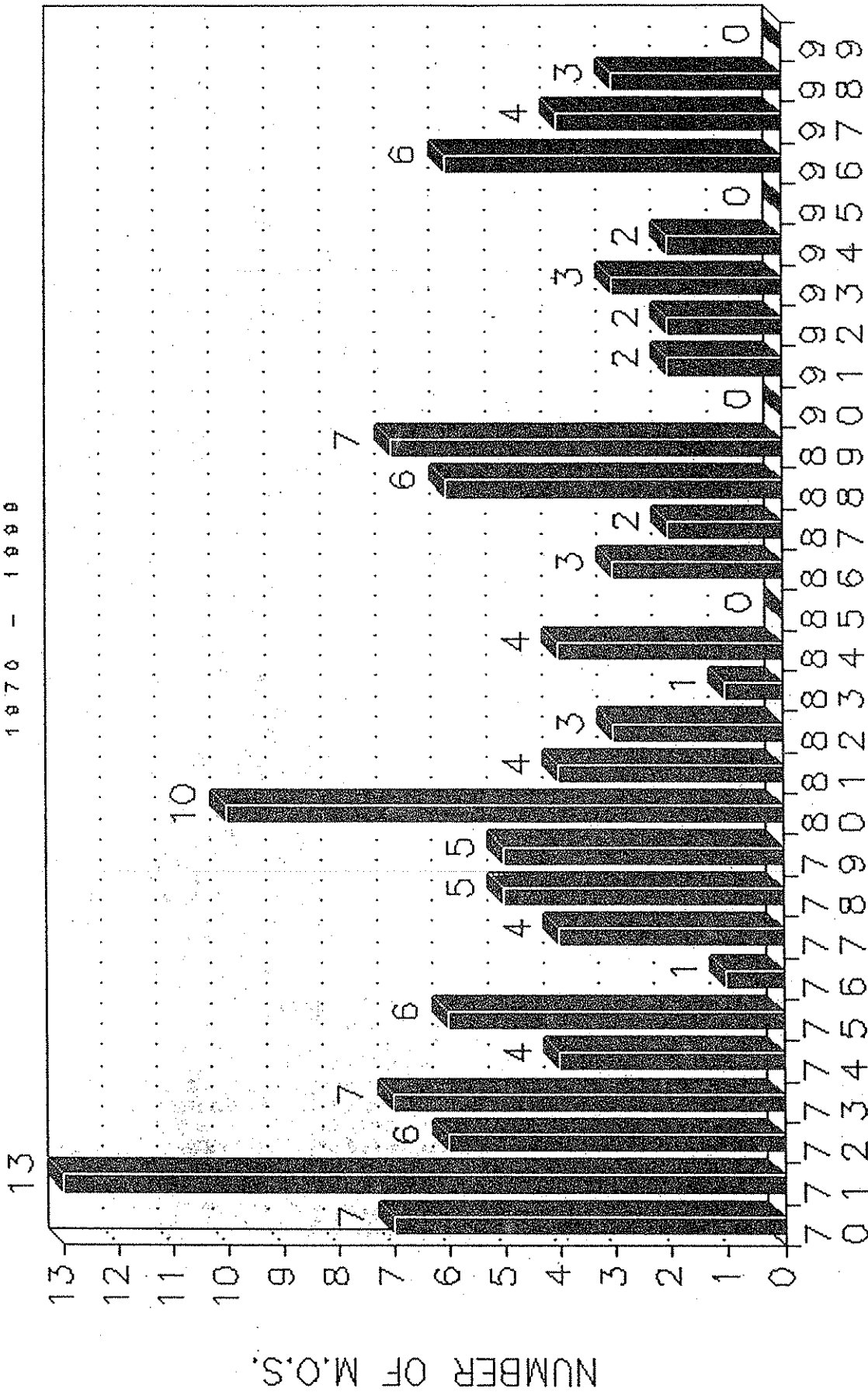
Of the 40 MOS Injured:

1970 - 1999



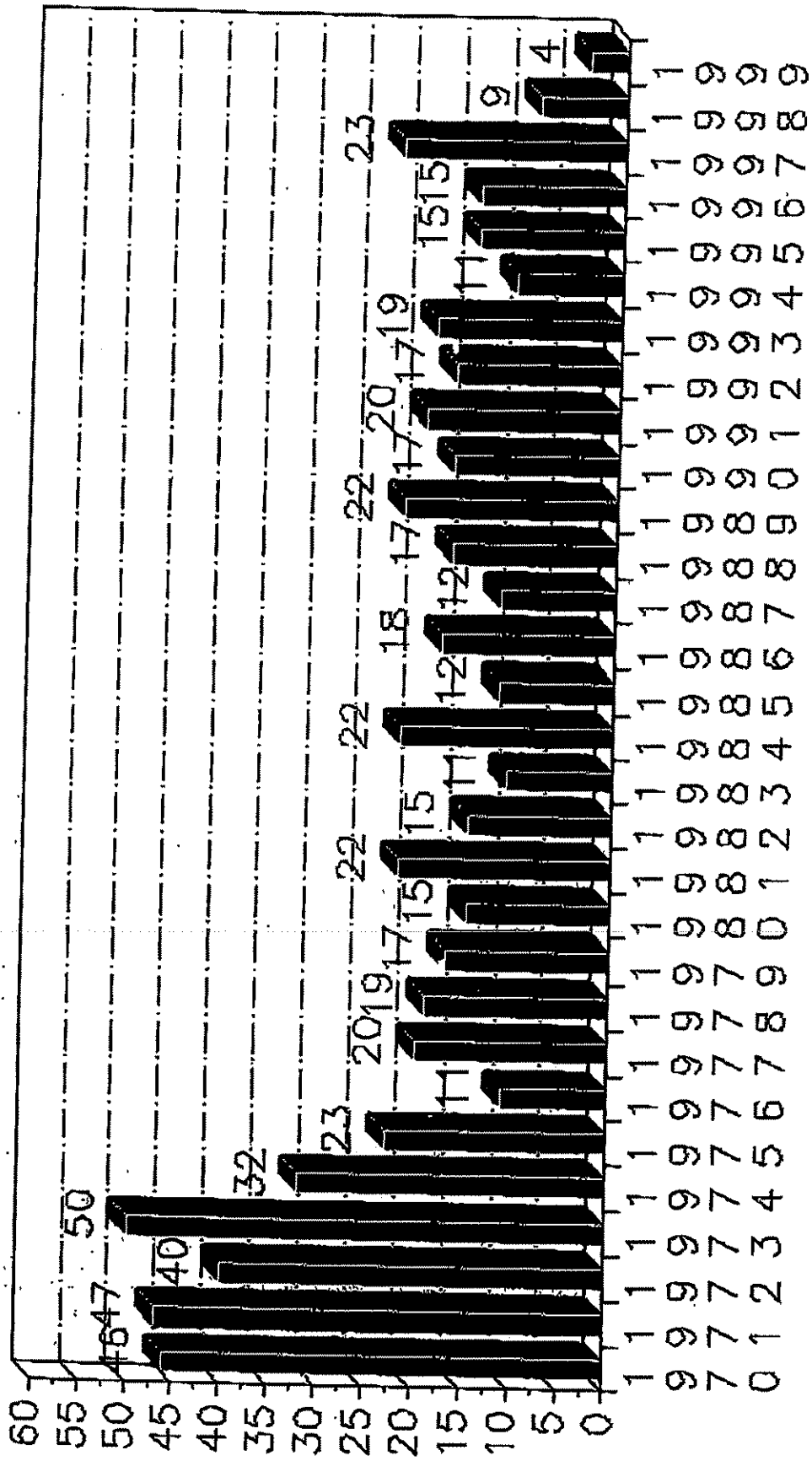

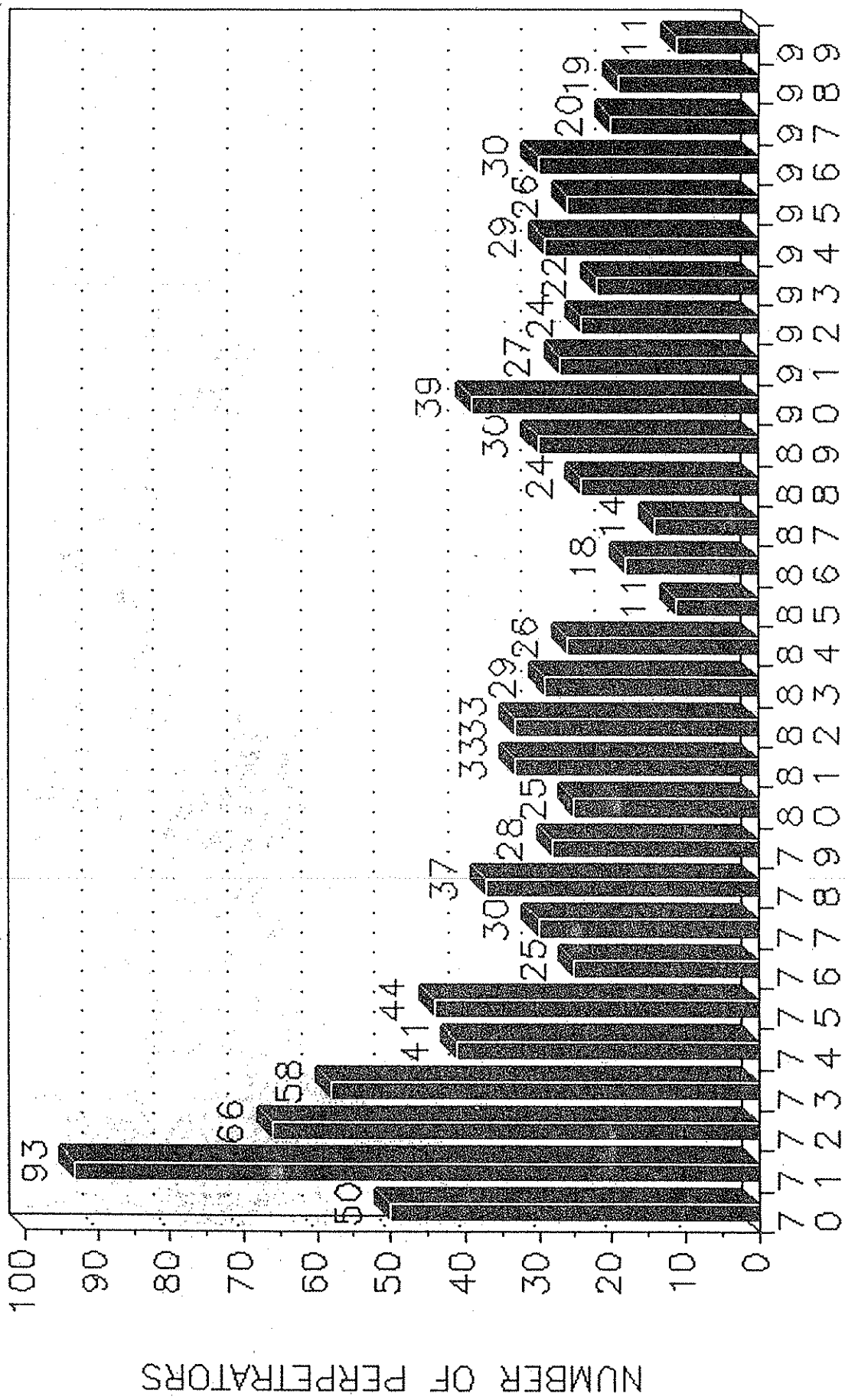

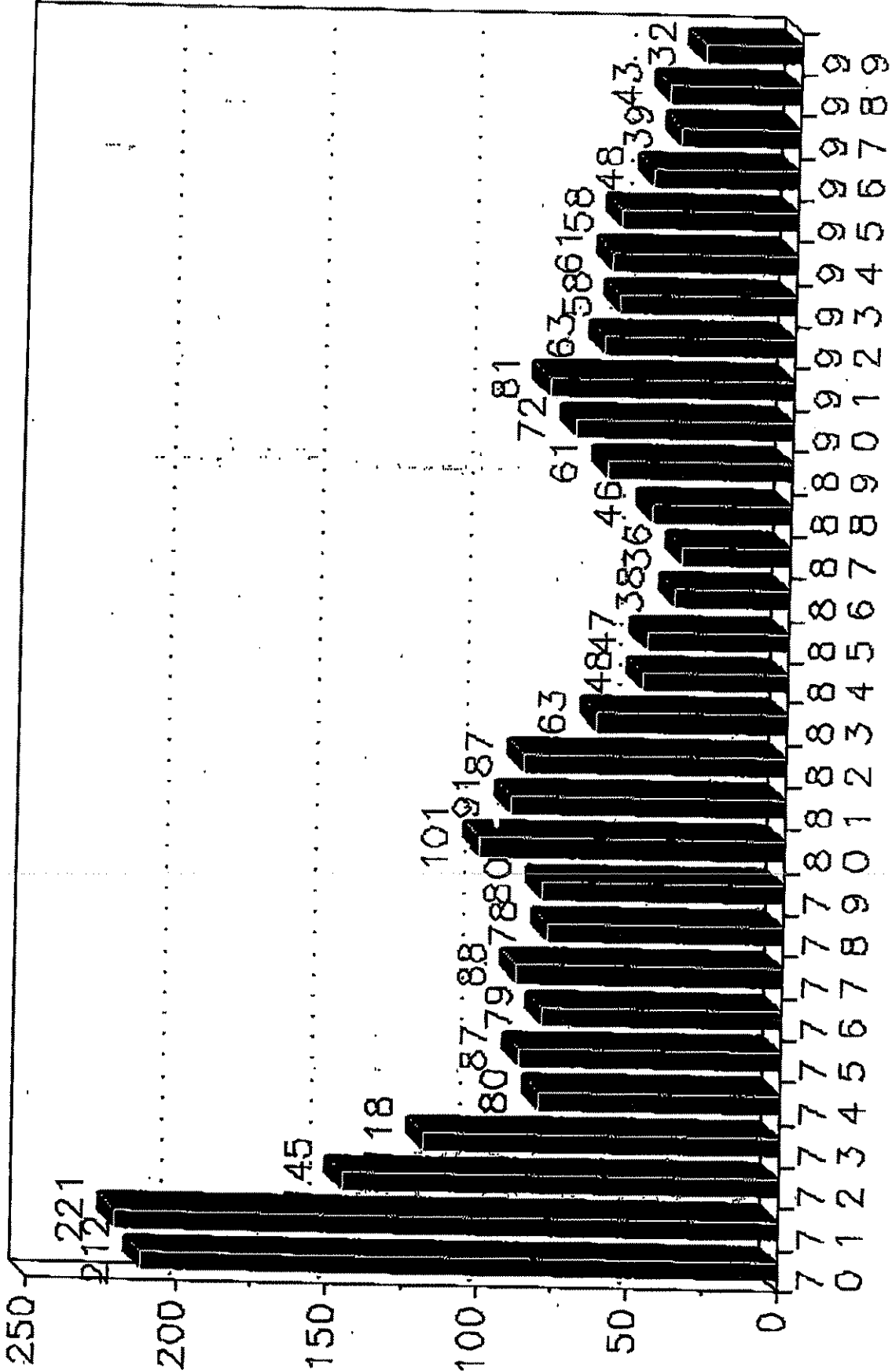

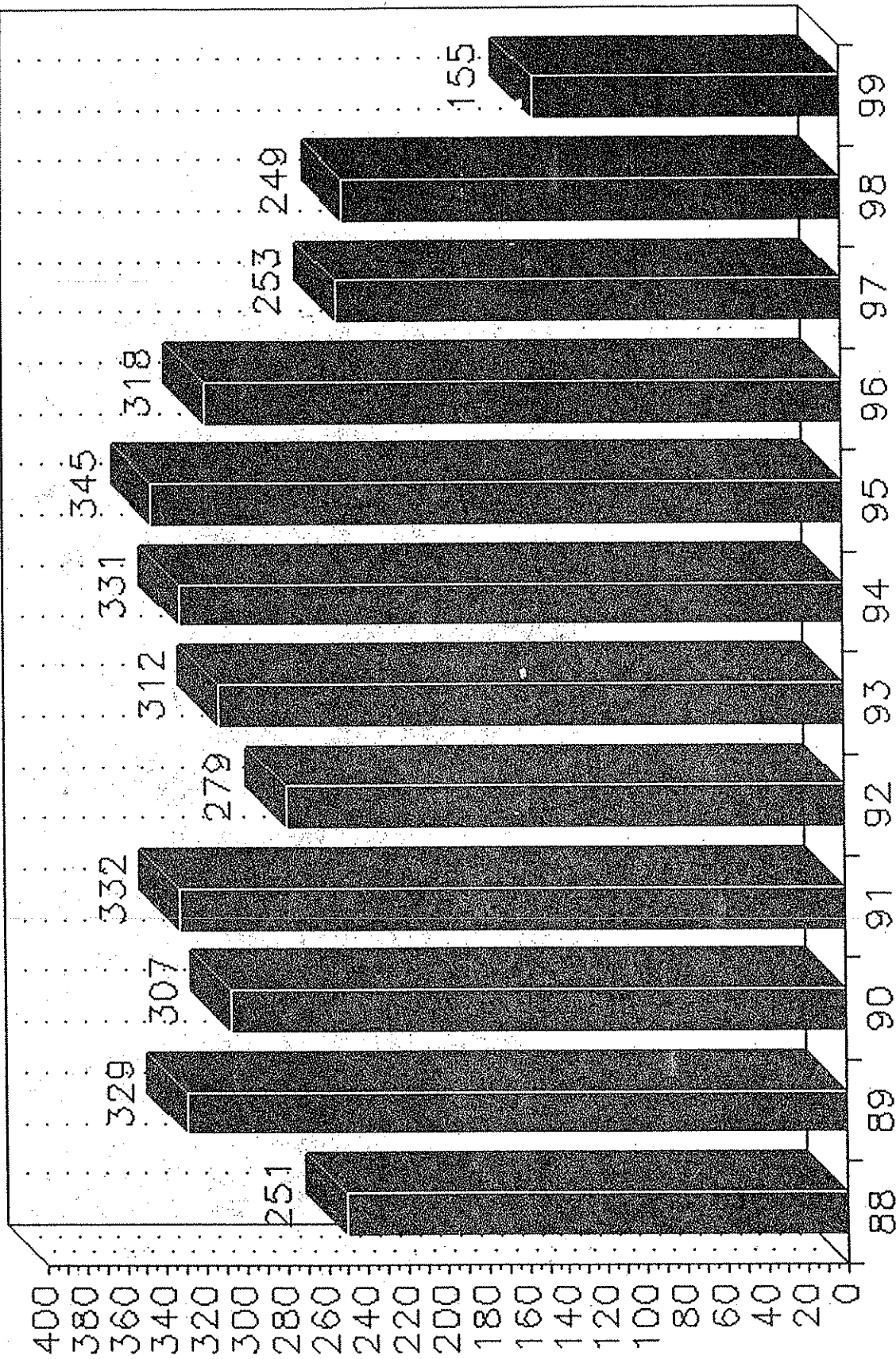

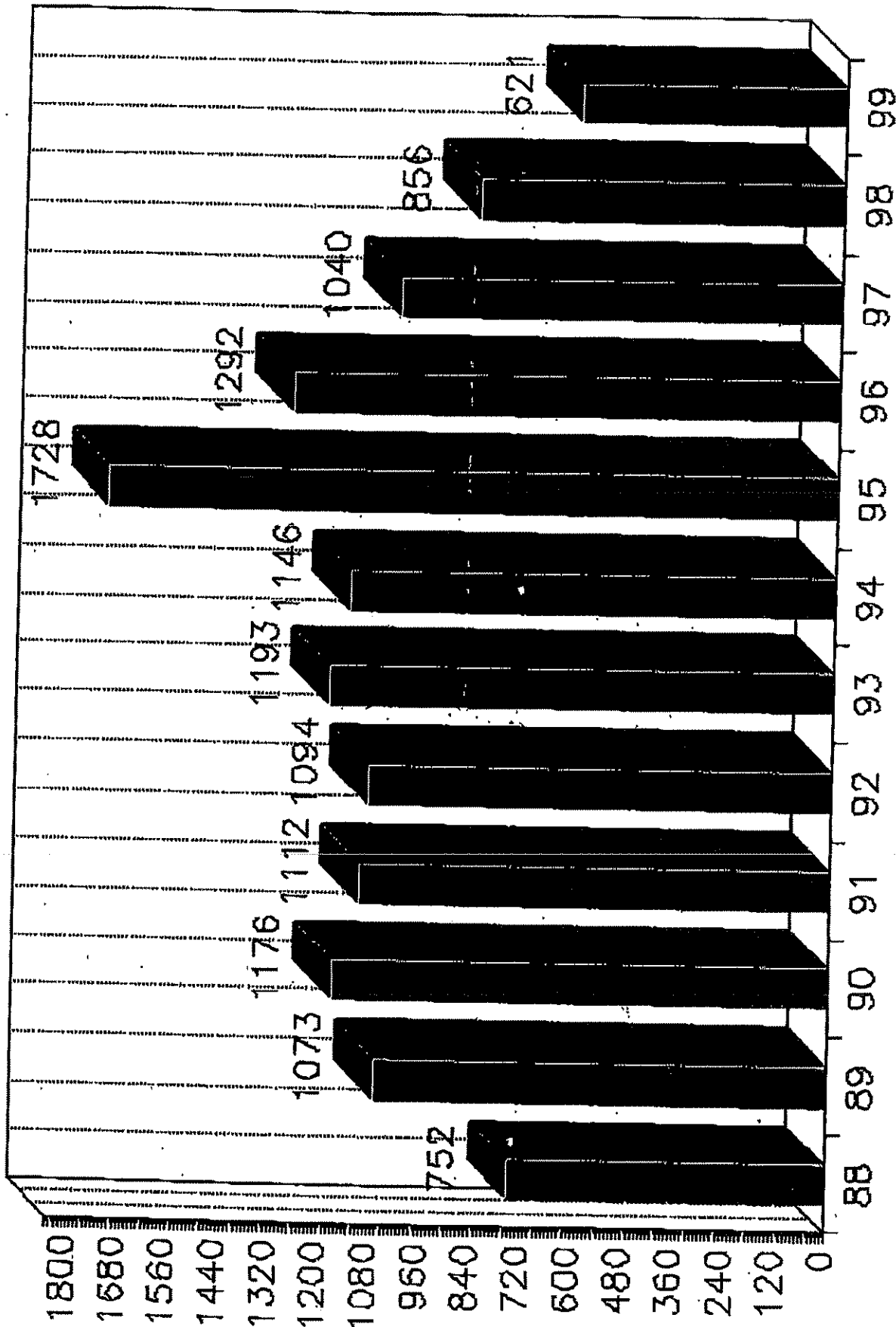


NUMBER OF SHOOTING INCIDENTS
